Neskowin Citizen Advisory Committee Update

The Neskowin Citizen Advisory Committee (NCAC) is dedicated to promoting communications between citizens in the Neskowin area and governmental agencies on land use, safety and other related issues.

NCAC officers and subcommittee members are volunteers. When the NCAC membership, through open public meetings, make a decision, then the NCAC advocates that decision to governmental agencies.

The past year has been a very busy time for the NCAC. Activities undertaken and issues considered include:

- Work by the Community Plan Steering Subcommittee, revising and updating the Community Plan for submission to the County in 2025
- Formation of an Outreach Task Force
- Communications Task Force staffing additions
- Publication of County land use actions on the website / meetings
- Revision, review and adoption of revised NCAC Bylaws
- Draft Policies and Procedures to guide the NCAC's actions on certain issues
- Provide a community-supported position statement to the County regarding the FEMA BiOp decision
- Annual elections held in April, with new officers assuming their roles in July 2025
- Informational forum held about County Ballot Measure 29-183 (Transient lodging tax increase from 10%-14%).

As we move into the 2025-2026 year, we recognize the following changes in the organization. Gary Billingsley is leaving as secretary and we are actively looking for his replacement, Thank you, Gary! Mark Everett will continue as NCAC Chair for another term. We welcome Carole Hoke and Kim Noreen to the Outreach Task Force.

NCAC thanks those who were directly involved with our organization over the past year. We applaud your commitment and dedication to the organization and the community. And thanks to the many community members who attended and participated in more than sixty meetings this past year. Your comments and feedback ensure that the actions of the NCAC reflect the wishes of the community.

Membership in the NCAC is open to all property owners, business owners and residents of Neskowin. Records of past meetings can be found on the NCAC website at "Reference/FAQ". There you will find agendas, minutes, videos and chats for each meeting. Emergency Beach Access Repairs Grant

The NCA was recently awarded a \$75,000 grant to make repairs and improvements on four beach access points used by emergency vehicles and personnel for rescue operations. The Transit Lodging Tax (TLT) from Tillamook Coast Visitors Association is the grantor of the funds for local tourism facilities repairs and improvements.

With railing repairs due in mid-May for the Carlton Ave. stone stairs, damage from winter storms has already been repaired at McMinnville, Mt. Angel, and Carlton East access ramps by Justin Haft Excavating. New signs to keep vehicles off the beach and from parking on the ramps are also in place.

The three-year grant was written by grant managers Cameron Nagel for the NCA. Randall is also the fiscal agent for the grant as a representative of the Neskowin Community Association.

Emergency Supply Sheds

Existing emergency supply sheds are fully stocked with items on our 24-hour basic needs list. These include MRE's, warming items, water storage, lighting, and first aid. STCEVC is working on our final phase of procurement to stock these sheds with 96-hour sustainability materials such as bulk food stuffs, cooking supplies, and water purification supplies. Our emergency supply sheds currently are located on Hillcrest Drive and South Beach Road; a temporary storage area is located in Sahali South.

STCEVC is seeking to establish an emergency supply shed in Hawk Creek Hills to serve that Evacuation Assembly Area. Our efforts to find a location in Hawk Creek Hills have been stymied by the lack of suitable public or utility land. If any resident or property owner in Hawk Creek Hills is willing to accommodate an 8' X 12' shed, please contact STCEVC President Dave Sears, David.Sears@stcevc.org.

Be 2 Weeks Ready (B2WR)

This is a new free program launched by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management. The program consists of eight training sessions designed to prepare Oregonians for potential emergencies such as windstorms, power and phone outages, floods, health-related emergencies, wildfires, and yes, the Big One, a catastrophic subduction zone earthquake and resulting tsunami.

Colleen Williams (The Crest/Pacific Sand Heights) and Barbara Triplett (South Beach) recently trained to serve as B2WR program coordinators. The program's success relies on additional volunteers in Neskowin and surrounding communities who can share the program's message with 10-15 of their neighbors. Nestucca, Neskowin & Sand Lake Watersheds Council Update

The Watersheds Council focuses on monitoring, restoring, and enhancing aquatic and riparian areas in south Tillamook County. In Neskowin, the Watershed Council is working on four culvert replacement projects for Sutton Creek in South Beach. These culverts are a priority for the Watershed Council. They are barriers to fish passage and cause flooding. The Council is actively working to fill a funding gap for these projects, which require funding and expertise from many partner agencies including the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, US Fish and Wildlife, US Forest Service, Hebo Stewardship Group-Cascade Pacific Resource Conservation and Development, and the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board.

Next spring, ODOT will start construction of a bridge over Butte Creek, US 101, located just north of the fire hall. This project will include removal and replacement of a failing undersized culvert under the highway. Once construction is completed, there will be one remaining failing culvert that to be replaced on Butte Creek, opening up 2.66 miles of migratory fish habitat. The Council hopes to remove this last barrier to fish passage in the upcoming years. The Watershed Council is in its third year of our volunteer-led water quality monitoring program. This multi-year project collects data on e.coli levels in creeks throughout south Tillamook County, including four creeks in Neskowin. The Watershed Council modeled its water quality monitoring program after Tillamook Estuaries Partnership's (TEP) program, which has been running for two decades. While e.coli naturally occurs in all waterways, it can become an issue when it exceeds the State Standards. TEP and the Watershed Council upload the results of this monitoring program to TEP's Water Quality Map each week. You can check out these results at https://www.tbnep.org/maps/ Collecting data over multiple years builds a robust dataset of trends and levels of e.coli related to seasonal patterns naturally occurring in our waterways. This data can be used to focus future restoration work. In addition, TEP is using the data to identify areas where septic tanks may be leaching into waterways and are in need of repair.

The Watershed Council received a grant two years ago to develop a beaver management plan for the Neskowin area. We have yet to find funds to implement the plan.

Secure Funding for Road Improvements in June

The road improvement collaboration organized by the Midnight Pavers and given an incentive by the Neskowin Community Association to raise \$25,000 from the community outdid itself and met the \$25,000 match, then surpassed it by raising over \$41,000.

Work on five key areas of chronic potholes will begin in June in collaboration with volunteers -still room for some younger volunteers- with more than \$50,000 in asphalt provided by Tillamook County Public Works, a paving contractor and Neskowin Water District, who will elevate manhole covers and utility boxes to road level.

Two layers of asphalt will allow for leveling of specific sites and then a crowned paving to facilitate draining of water. Gravel shoulders will help preserve the edges.

The increase in donations will help the projects reach some other neighborhoods with volunteers from the Beach Crest and Hawk Creek Hills neighborhoods stepping up to fix potholes in their neighborhoods. Target date for the work is June 9-10.

Neskowin road work volunteers will prepare roads for the paving and dress the shoulders with gravel. If interested please contact Ken King at ken.peggy@hotmail.com. If you would like to help with Traffic Control, please contact Lauri Braich at lkbrajic@gmail.com.

Neskowin Valley School Launches New Wild Coast Camp

A new adventure is launching on the Oregon Coast this summer with the debut of Wild Coast Camp, a nature-based day camp designed to immerse children in the coastal landscape through hands-on wilderness and bushcraft skills, forest adventures, and beach exploration. Wild Coast Camp is an extension of the school's mission to nurture curiosity, resilience, and a connection to the natural world.

Developed by the team at Neskowin Valley School, Wild Coast Camp offers a unique, experience-rich alternative to traditional summer camps. Wild Coast Camp is open to children entering Kindergarten through 7th grade. Each week-long session will focus on outdoor skills such as shelter-building, wildlife tracking, navigation, and ecosystem exploration in our forests, rivers, and shorelines. Activities are age-appropriate and guided by experienced outdoor educators.

This summer also marks the launch of special 3 and 4-year-old camp weeks. This younger camp group will be led by the school's new preschool–K teacher, with its own playful and developmentally appropriate curriculum offering little explorers a gentle introduction to outdoor learning.

Four Junior Counselor positions are available for rising 8th graders or 14-year-olds interested in developing their own leadership and mentoring skills in an outdoor setting.

Neskowin Valley School is open for enrollment for the 2025–2026 school year, welcoming families who value child-led, place-based education rooted in the unique environment of the Oregon Coast.
